





The purpose of the Arcs-of-a-Circle Artists' Residency Mumbai was to provide a 10-day crucible for artists across art forms to converge and converse around women's empowerment.



The co-founders of this program were: The US Consulate General Mumbai helmed by James B Fennell, Cultural Affairs Officer (CAO); Almitra Kika, Public Affairs/Public Diplomacy Specialist; Nandita Shah and Nandita Gandhi, Co-directors - Akshara Centre - a women's rights organization; and fictionist and poet Rochelle Potkar.

Akshara Centre works towards changing mindsets of the youth, on one hand, and systems-change on the other. It has striven to build public-private partnerships leading to institutionalized initiatives with the police, local municipalities, and transport authorities in creating safer cities for women. Having worked to further the cause of gender justice, and fight gender-based violence locally, nationally, and internationally, it saw this residency as an act of breaking silos between art and activism.

Rochelle Potkar has dwelled on the body of a woman in a feminist spectrum from erotica fiction to resistance poetry. Once back from Iowa's International Writing Program in the Fall 2015, she based the outlines of the residency on her experiences at Iowa. She too hoped to break competitive silos that formed in one type of art form with a collaborative spirit that infuses itself across art forms to an ekphrastic harmonization.

These earlier ideas and outlines of the program were, however, enriched with broader and deeper strokes in regular brainstorming meetings between James, Almitra, Nandita, and Rochelle at the US Consulate Mumbai.

For this year 2017, the program received 269 submissions, of which 12 participants were selected through the criteria of:

- 1. Innovation in content in idiom, metaphor, language, and/or imagery.
- 2. Performative element gleaned from the audio/video recordings in terms of vocal voice.
- 3. Strength and structure of content portraying authorial voice (Point-of-view/world view).
- 4. Promise of performance seen/heard through the video/audio for the future as an artist-of-the-world.
- 5. Their biography that gave a glimpse of their art-footprint, and thematic focuses.

These participants came from across India to showcase their work and share their views. Poets, a translator, dancers (in three styles: modern, Kathak, and Bharatanatyam), a filmmaker, a singer-song writer, a multi-disciplinary artist (working with moving image, soundscapes and installation art), a stand-up comedian, and a few storytellers attended the program to piece together one arc of the whole narrative around women's empowerment.

The emphasis was on individual work and collaborative work formed during the residency, that with surprising alchemy could lead to a symbiosis and synthesis of single art-forms.





Out of the 15 participants chosen, two dropped out at the last minute due to prior commitments and one – singer-songwriter Sanjeeta Bhattacharya could only attend the last day of the program.









# Anjali Khurana Contemporary Dancer, Theatre Artist, Actor

Anjali Khurana is an actor, dancer, choreographer, voice artist, activist, and entrepreneur. Born and raised in Cambridge, Massachusetts, Anjali pursued her passion for dance and theatre from a young age. She is trained in neuroscience at Harvard and a Master in Public Administration at Columbia. Both in India and abroad, she has accumulated a vast body of work that spans regular live performances with an Improv Comedy troupe (Improv Comedy Mumbai), several plays, short films, commercial and indie feature films, music videos, and several commercials.

# Chandramohan S. **Poet and Social Activist**

Chandramohan S. is an Indian English Dalit poet and literary critic based in Kerala. His poems were shortlisted for Srinivas Rayaprol Poetry Prize 2016. His second collection of poems is titled. 'Letters to Namdeo Dhasal' is just published. A few of his poems have been used at many protest in addition to being anthologized in LAND: An Anthology of Indo-Australian Poetry, and 40 poets under 40. In year 2016, OUTLOOK magazine had profiled him as one of the high achievers from the Dalit community. In addition to being an aspiring rapper, he is currently collaborating with a musician to make a rap album of Dalit poetry.



# Vikram Sridhar Storyteller and Theatre Artist

Vikram Sridhar is an Oral Performance storyteller, story researcher, and theatre practitioner based in Bangalore, India who believes in the power of oral traditions and stories, in particular, in a technology-filled world that has to be adapted to today's times.

He is the co-founder of Tahatto, a Bangalore-based award-winning theatre group. He has volunteered and worked with different organizations in the animal welfare and conservation space from his childhood days. He also consults and works with organizations in the social sector.

#### The 10-day Program

7th December, In Search of Goya, poet and slam champion Eloise Stevens conducted a storytelling workshop for the participants at Dosti House, American Library.

The morning began with introductory speeches by James B Fennell, Nandita Shah, Rochelle Potkar, and Almitra Kika.

Eloise Stevens initiated the workshop by asking participants to introduce themselves by performing their names. Next, she urged them to tell a story in one sentence each standing in a circle, followed by creating a one-word story, and then by weaving a story using only movement.

The purpose of this was to make the participants realize how syntax works and enables them to let go. Next, was on why stories are important and the feedback given by the participants was on themes like sublimation, documentation, memories, translation, and transcreation.

The other thought-provoking question she asked was, "Why do we tell stories?" This recei<mark>ved varied res</mark>ponses: to feel alive, seek relief, a means to an end, a means in itself, for sharing, and also for selfish reasons of expressions.

Eloise imparted some storytelling theories - exposition, action, climax, and resolution, then divided participants into four teams with a performance artist in each team, asking them to strike out lines from the newspaper and make a creative based on words and performance.

With an outstanding use of words in poetry or news snippets, we saw collaborative performances of a kathak dance, puppet dance, and a mime.

The groups first performed individually and then collectively creating a greater impact, and showing the difference.

The entire exercise enabled participants to open up from within to new story and collaborative possibilities, thus emphasizing the spirit of ekphrasis.

















8th December, Day 2 was quieter, spent in-house.

After the morning's breakfast at West End Hotel, Nandita Gandhi conducted a riveting and thought-provoking talk on activism. Her talk, in a way, set the tone of what was to come, also giving artists a preview into activism.

A recce was planned for the dancers at Essar House.

Vikram Sridhar gave a talk at St. Xavier's college on behalf of the residency on oral storytelling, and Kajol Srinivasan spoke at KC college on women in stand-up comedy in India.


In the afternoon, Jayita Sengupta and Deepika Sharma presented their life's work over a 40-minute presentation each.


10th December being Sunday was spent relaxing, reflecting and contemplating in quietude.

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15th December morning academician Gita Chadha from Mumbai University gave a lecture to the participants on feminist theories.







#### Feedback from Sudipta Dhruva, residency participant:



"...it was a great concept to get artists from different spaces to collaborate on one issue. It challenged us to think of different ways, and the inputs we received through the different sessions with activists and experts was very helpful. I will always cherish this experience and be grateful to all of you for giving us this amazing opportunity, which I am sure will spawn some exciting work from all of us.

For the future, I hope to work with Vikram on creating a longer dramatic piece based on my presentation done at the 17th December finale. Also, we intend to create more storytelling opportunities together and for each other. I plan to create a piece for Women's day with Prajakta which we have discussed using poetry and dance. We are both very excited about that. I, also, plan to collaborate with Deepika and Anjali on a presentation that we can make on women and mental health issues and get a grant for it from Universities in the US. Maybe even collaborate with artists in San Marcos on it."

## Plans for the future - the next one year...

The participants have gone on to collaborate in their own cities.

Somrita G. and Apeksha G. performed recently at Pune IIFT, while Chandramohan S. and Vishal Kumaraswamy are implementing a visual media installation of two poems that examine islamophobia from a cubist perspective.

Karthik Shankar plans to create a literary journal (published annually) which would contain prose, poetry, photography from the residency based on its themes and ideas; and hold writing workshops on prose or poetry.

Kajol Srinivasan plans to collaborate with Vikram S., where she envisages presenting of similar topics on feminism but in two different ways at colleges or forums. She says, "We both communicate in a light fashion. It would be fun to hear a story first and then hear humor on current issues. Also, I feel we can both connect with children."

Kajol also hopes to do an improv jam event with Somrita and Prajakta, where they take relevant suggestions from the audience and interpret it live in three different forms. She hopes to also partner with Somrita to do stand-up performances in English and Hindi or Bangla with her performing the same set in different languages, also partnering with Sudipta to formulate a storytelling and humor show for corporates.

"I personally am going to look at conducting comedy workshops in colleges where I'm going to introduce it as a tool to promote feminist dialogue. I'm going to try to do male female interactive discussions through comedy in shows."

Most participants have collaborative ideas up their sleeves that they hope to execute in their cities to amplify the message of women's empowerment that began in December 2017 at the Arcs-of-a-Circle artists' residency Mumbai.









The participants did not forget to share camaraderie and a few laughs as they go on to discuss, brainstorm and collaborate on newer ideas. Women's empowerment is a long arduous journey that cannot be executed without lightness in one's step, promise in one's heart, a strong twinkle in one's eyes, and the knowledge that we are not alone in this quest for justice, equality, and anti-discremination no matter how unyielding or impossible the challenges might seem, it is one day going to be made possible. One step at a time, each moment.

Rochelle Potkar

Feminist scholar and activist with over 25 years of experience, Dr. Nandita Shah is active in the women's rights movement for more than two decades, as activist, researcher, gender trainer, and writer. She has co-authored several books, such as: Contingent Workers: Women in Two Industries in Mumbai, and Issues at Stake: Theory and Practice in the Contemporary Women's Movement in India with Nandita Gandhi. In 1995, she co-founded Akshara Centre, a women's rights organization based in Mumbai. Akshara Centre works towards mindset change of youth, on one hand, and systems change on the other. Her expertise in building different public-private partnerships have led to institutionalized initiatives with the police and local municipalities, transport authorities for creating safer cities for women. Akshara Centre works with different stakeholders to further the cause of gender justice, and fight gender-based violence locally, nationally, and internationally.

She has been on many expert committees including with the Planning Commission on Gender Rights, for drafting women's policy in Maharashtra.
